Our special thanks to Mari Heikkilä and Jens Degett, who completed their terms as EUSJA President and Vice-President respectfully. We hope to continue your good work!

We are pleased to inform you that, as the new board, we aim to implement various activities together with you.

First, there's a new section on the EUSJA website dedicated to job opportunities, European courses and European calls for proposals. We will also inform you about the scholarships and tenders open for journalists and for press offices in the EU.

Scientific journalists in all sectors are fundamental against fake news. We want to work with EUSJA members across Europe on a "Manifesto on the role of scientific journalists against fake news"

which we will then present to the European Parliament.

Over the next few months, we will invite you to organise some "interest groups" created for various specific areas such as food, environment, medicine, agriculture, IT, etc. This has been successfully done in UGIS in Italy. We look forward to giving your association's activities more visibility to other European associations.

Training

The European Commission has launched the <u>Union of Skills</u> as part of its competitiveness strategy.

An EUSJA member webinar on 03 December 2024 also focused on using artificial intelligence (AI) in the work of science journalists.

EUSJA Budapest annual general meeting

(The below post is a summary of the <u>original Hungarian version</u>)

Between 26 and 29 March 2025, many journalists from EUSJA arrived in Budapest, as our organisation (TÚK) offered to hold its annual general meeting. The new EUSJA board was also elected.

We also organised a study trip before the General Assembly, the main event of which was the trip to Szeged on 27 March. First, we visited the ELI-ALPS laser research centre, with a minibus provided by the centre also carrying several of our TÚK members interested in the trip.

At the first stop of the trip to Szeged, Katalin Varjú, scientific director, informed us and guided the journalists, who were also helped by the centre's communications staff, namely Zoltán Ötvös and Ágnes Bálint, PR team leaders. At the end of the visit, the centre also hosted us with a great lunch. The visit ended with great interest, and the guests spoke with the greatest appreciation about what they saw.

Then we visited the Biological Centre of Szeged, where we listened to several presentations. First, the guests received a brief overview of the HUN-REN institutional network, then about the BRC, which was followed by four professional presentations by the four member institutions.

The director of the Institute of Biophysics, Mária Deli, gave a presentation on biomedical applications of nano-sensors and chips.

László Nagy from the Institute of Biochemistry then gave a talk on a biotechnological topic on fungal strains, and Gábor Juhász from the Institute of Genetics on Drosophila research.

Finally Gergely Maróti gave a talk on the photo-bioenergetic application of algae on behalf of the Institute of Plant Biology.

After returning home, the foreign guests took part in a joint dinner in a good atmosphere in a nearby restaurant, the Kert Bistro.

The next day, on 28 March, the program continued with several interesting scientific lectures in the library hall of the Domus Collegium.



In accordance with an agreement with Tamás Simon, Head of the Communications Department of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences, two Lendület scholarship researchers gave very high-quality and interesting presentations.

First, Ivett Szalma from the

Institute of Sociology of HUN-REN gave a presentation on socially highly relevant reproductive research, then András Attila Horváth, director of the Neurocognitive Research Centre at the Gyula Nyírő National Institute of Psychiatry and Addiction, gave a presentation on dementia and Alzheimer's disease.

Richárd Ádám Vécsey, Al developer from the TÚK, informed about the novelties related to artificial intelligence, and Norbert Babcsán spoke about new materials science results.

Zsófia Végvári presented their technology developed for uncovering art forgeries, and finally, Gábor Lente dazzled foreign colleagues about the exciting mysteries and legends of chemistry in connection with his book.



The morning program was also a great success, which was definitely confirmed by the guests.

We continued to the Technical Study Collection of the National Museum of Technology and Transport in Újbuda, where Csaba Domonkos, Head of the Industrial Heritage Department, gave a presentation of the museum's incredibly rich collection.

The next day, on the 29th, the General Assembly was successfully held in the library hall of the Domus Collegium.

In addition to the usual agenda items, there were two important items, the decision to recruit the Balkan Network of Science Journalists, and the election of the leadership.

On the first point, after a lengthy debate, the Balkan Network was unanimously admitted as a member of the EUSJA, which includes science journalists from all Balkan countries, most of whom do not have their own national scientific journalism organization.

The leadership election also went smoothly. Fintan Burke from Ireland was elected President, Cinzia Bosciero from Italy became Vice-President, Dino Trescher from Germany remained Secretary and Lucia Torres from Spain also remained Treasurer.

The entire program was very successful, the guests strongly thanked the excellent hospitality and the successful study trip in several emails.



Potential EUSJA science trips

The JRC in Ispra, Italy - We would like to organise a science trip at Ispra, Italy, at the Joint Research Centre (JRC) which is part of the second pillar of Horizon Europe and provides scientific evidence and technical support to EU policies. The Joint Research Centre provides evidence-based support to EU policies throughout the policy process, independently of national, commercial or private interests.

The European Parliament in Brussels, Belgium - We'd like to organise a science trip in Brussels to meet some Members of the European Parliament and present them EUSJA and our manifesto as soon as it's approved by our members. Brussels is also home to several research centres and institutes, including the Joint Research Center (JRC), which has its headquarters in Brussels.



EUROfusion in Garching,

Germany - We will try to organise a science trip to EUROfusion Labs, because in a virtually unprecedented alignment of efforts, Europe's major fusion research experiments have also entered a high-intensity experiment phase, showcasing Europe's strong collaboration and leadership in the global quest to develop fusion as a sustainable energy source.



Grants and EU calls

European Network of Fact Checkers

The EU has launched a call to maintain and further develop a platform to support the operations of the European Digital Media Observatory (EDMO), and deepen the linguistic coverage and operational capacity of fact-checking in Europe.

In particular, the topic supports operational cooperation between fact-checkers, researchers and media literacy practitioners across the EU through EDMO.

It will support fact-checkers, with the aim of contributing to the fight against disinformation, gaining further insights into disinformation, monitoring the disinformation space, debunking disinformation through the fact-checkers network and to increase the resistance of media professionals and citizens to disinformation.

It has a budget of €5,000,000

EU Call on Pan-European Reporting

This call for proposals named "PAN-EUROPEAN REPORTING", with a budget of EUR 13.5 million, aims to support independent pan European reporting on EU affairs by EU media outlets. The deadline is 13 June 2025.

The call aims to enhance the quantity, quality and impact of such reporting, in as many languages and EU countries as possible and particularly where this offer is scarce.

Part of the support is specifically dedicated to set up and/or maintain an EU international audiovisual news service in Hungarian.

Applicants are expected to produce and disseminate news content using both traditional and new media formats and distribution channels.

Fake news

EDMO is managed by a consortium led by the European University Institute in Florence and collaborates with the Athens Technology Center, the Danish University of Aarhus and the organisation Pagella Politica.

In addition, the European Commission has co-financed several research projects with the Horizon program against disinformation and in particular to combat the spread of fake news on social media.

European Media Board

The new European Media
Services Board (Media Board)
held its constituent meeting in
February, marking a milestone
in the implementation of the
European Regulation on
Media Freedom.

The Media Board is an independent advisory body at Union level established by EMFA, composed of representatives of national media regulators, which will replace and continue the work of the European Regulators Group for Audiovisual Media Services.

Three-week summer journalism internship at Carbon Brief

This is in a hybrid format, involving time in person at the offices near Borough station in central London as well as remote working.

Guest residencies for journalists with a focus on the history, philosophy, and sociology of science at the Max Planck Institute for the History of Science, Berlin

The Institute offers guest journalist residencies of up to two months each. This exciting fellowship presents the opportunity for journalists in all forms of media around the world to gain insight into the work of an international research institute.

Science Journalism Initiative

The ERC wishes to support an organisation or a consortium of organisations to set up a funding scheme that would facilitate 3-5-month stays of journalists at research institutions.

The purpose is to give journalists opportunities to learn and work on in-depth reporting projects by immersing themselves in the research environment and interacting with scientists and scholars. Such opportunities – organised for example in collaboration with ERC host institutions and in ERC grantees' teams and labs – should facilitate better understanding of frontier research, while respecting journalistic independence.



Job opportunities

The "Frontiers" project

FRONTIERS is the science journalism initiative funded by the European Research Council to design a residency program for journalists wishing to experience an immersive period in a research institution.

The FRONTIERS project is set to run from 2023 to 2027. During this time, the FRONTIERS Team plans to enable up to 40 science journalists to spend time with research teams, working on their own reporting ideas at institutions of their choice.

While backing independent science journalism, FRONTIERS hopes to contribute to the public's trust in science, to tackling misinformation and to improving social resilience against disinformation.

Networking and innovative tools

Artificial Intelligence Tools for Science Journalists

There is a free online guide named "Al Tools for science journalists" that aims to enhance knowledge of Al tools that can assist in the practice of science journalism. While not exhaustive, the tools listed are those considered most useful.

EJC net for journalists

In partnership with NOVA University in Lisbon, The Journalism & Science Alliance (JSA) will deliver grant funding, training, mentoring and networking to drive the production of local, regional, and transnational investigative journalism backed by science and enhance cross-sectoral collaboration between journalism and research institutions. The programme will run over the next two years across Europe and will award €2.7 million in grants to support science-based research journalism. The programme is co-funded by the European Union's Creative Europe programme.
